Ever since I learned how, I've always been an avid reader. My parents didn't have a television until I was about ten years old. That never bothered me. The library always had a lot of entertainment. In later life, when I was in the Navy, I seldom watched the

ship's movie. I was busy finishing reading one more chapter before lights out. These days, I still read about 20 magazines each month. I am usually reading four or five books at a time. I've got my bedside book, bathroom book, digital book and an audio book for my morning walk.

I could not even estimate how many thousands of dollars I've spent buying reading material of one form or another. In the past three or four years, my reading has all become either digital or audio. I haven't been in a bookstore or looked at a magazine display rack in at least two years. For me, it's all been for the better. In this article, I'm going to tell you how you can do the same.

I've saved a lot of money with e-books and audio books. One of the reasons is because it is so easy to check the material out from your local library. From my easy chair I can check out a vast number of books (both digital and audio), magazines, comic books, movies and much more.

There are many internet sites where electronic books can be downloaded for no charge. All the major booksellers offer some free books, but there are many other places where you can get a better choice. A good place to start your search is at Tech Support Alert's Free eBooks And Audiobooks To Read Online Or Download. <http://bit.ly/2XSHG1M>. This is the launch page of categories. It links to other sites that list free e-books with download information. The lists are sorted by genre. At the time of this writing there are 913 sites listed. These pages also have links to sites for downloading comic books, textbooks and online courses. Bonus tip: if you read the user comments, you will find many other sites.

Some other sites that I use to download free books (in no particular order) are:

- Project Gutenberg was one of the first e-book sites. There are more than 59,000 titles. It has by far the largest list of free titles for downloading and the site is easy to use. <https://www.gutenberg.org/>
- LibriVox is like Project Gutenberg except it is all audio books. Volunteers read and record books and upload them. There can be a large variance in audio quality. <https://librivox.org/>
- Open Library is a section of the Internet Archive. The goal is to have a web page for every book ever published. Most pages have links to where you can get the book. Some of the book are readable in your web browser. You can borrow others for a two-week period. <https://openlibrary.org/>
- Bookbub is a site that I check daily. It isn't a download site but lists the latest deals on Amazon, Barnes & Noble, Apple, Google and Kobo. Many of the books are for sale (usually \$0.99 or \$1.99) but it also lists many free books. Use the link I've provided; you won't have to give them an e-mail address. eBook Reader is a review site for all things e-reading. You can find information on both hardware and software. They have an extensive section of where you can

download books (both free and paid). There are also several how-to guides.

I hope this list of sites has piqued your interest and gets you started on e-book reading. This is nowhere near a complete list of download sites for e-books. If you're like me and like to read, these links should get you started.

CAMUG August 2019 Meeting Minutes

Shortly after 6 PM, Dennis Smith talked about using the Windows 10 Resource Monitor. Using a PowerPoint presentation and live screens from his own laptop, he described how it differs from the Task Manager, the tabs of the Resource Monitor and the information available from it. The Resource Monitor can display much more detail about the tasks running in your computer than the Task Manager is able to display. He also demonstrated how to customize the displays, and various actions that can be taken from the screens.

Regular Meeting



President Dennis Smith called the 432nd meeting of CAMUG to order at 7:12 PM on Monday, August 19, 2019, at Holy Cross Lutheran Church. There were 10 members and two visitors present. Since that is more than 15% of the membership, the meeting was declared valid.

The "On-Time Drawing" was held. The following numbers were drawn: 28 (Chad Wilson – absent), 30 (no name associated), 15 (Carol Joliat – no badge), 9 (Morris Dingman – absent), 13 (Robert Hirst – absent), 7 (Mike Charney – absent), 2 (Jan Bredon – absent), 18 (Alice Lungociu – absent), and 25 (Gerald Schaefer – present). Gerry was present, was wearing his badge, and was awarded the On-Time Drawing prize.

Dennis reminded members of the renewal credit of \$5.00 for each new member brought in. He also asked members to suggest topics for meetings.

Dennis asked whether anyone had not yet installed Windows 10 1903 Update, and a few still have not upgraded yet.

Dennis announced that the same people who presented to us via video in July (Jim and Chris Guld) will be here ***IN PERSON*** to present to us! There are several presentations that we can select from. Since several members have asked about blogging in the past, it was decided to request the presentation that discussed that

topic. Dennis asked all members to **please** spread the word to all of your friends, so that we can have a great turnout for our guests.

Featured Program: What's New in Windows 10 1903

Dennis once again used a PowerPoint for this presentation. First, he took a look back at some Windows releases, showing which ones were still supported by Microsoft, and which ones are not safe to place online anymore. (Windows 7, 8.1, and 10 are the only safe ones, and 7 joins the unsafe group on January 14, 2020 – just 5 months away!)

Then, he discussed the Windows patch schedule (“Patch Tuesday”), and how often a computer’s Windows Update automatically checks for updates.

The rest of the presentation focused on the changes that Microsoft included in the 1903 update to Windows 10. While most of the changes are minor, and some are hard to even notice, several were more significant. The most significant was the separation of Cortana and Search. Also, the change in the default sort order for the Downloads folder is quite nice. A Sandbox is included, but only if you have the Pro or Enterprise version of Windows 10 (most of us have the Home version). Some other changes were made to various Settings menus (such as Accounts), and the Focus Assist will make movie watchers and gamers happy (no interruptions while in full-screen). Also, even Home users will be able to delay Windows Updates a bit (the doc I read said 35 days, but my screens say 7 days). And Feature Updates (like 1903 was) can be skipped until the currently installed feature update goes off support (usually 18 months after the next one is released). And, hold on to your hats, the background of the login screen will now blur as you login. Plus, a microphone in the system tray will indicate if an app is using your microphone (possibly eavesdropping). Plus, buggy updates will be backed out and put on hold for 30 days. There is also an easier way to reset your computer to a “naked” Windows 10 install, but be careful, as it will remove all installed programs other than Windows itself.

After the break, the 50/50 drawing was held. Because less than \$20 was collected, a ticket for only the cash prize was selected. The winning ticket was held by Bernie Newsome, so he received the cash prize.

At 8:59 PM, Lila Chapman moved to adjourn the meeting, Ruth Albright seconded the motion, and the meeting was adjourned.
