Next CAMUG Meeting, January 18, 2021 On Zoom


Dennis will email an invitation to the **Zoom** meeting to members. At meeting time, simply click on the link in the invitation to join the meeting.

Hyperlinks Are Cool



One of the really fun and easy things technology has brought us is hyperlinks. You probably use them all the time and don't even realize how cool they really are. Click on a hyperlink and PRESTO you are instantly somewhere else – tele-transported like Star Trek to another planet.



You may know hyperlinks by other names such as “hotlinks”, “hypertext”, or simply as a “link”. Most often a hyperlink text is in [blue](#) and underlined, but not always. Let's see how they work when we are using our web browser (Firefox, Microsoft Edge, Safari, or whatever internet browser you use) to explore the internet. On almost every web page you will see some words underlined and in blue – if you click on them with your mouse (or touch them on a touchscreen) you will go to another web page. (The web page address will change in the address bar at the top of your web browser window). This is real magic. The people who have created that first web page put in a hyperlink that will take you someplace else. On your web browser, if you click on the backward arrow at the top you will return to the previous web page where you started. As you explore the web you are creating a “chain” of web pages you have viewed in this session one web-page link after another. You can go backward or forwards along this chain by clicking the left or right arrows at the top.

Here are some helpful things about hyperlinks:

A hyperlink can be text, an icon, or a photo. It can be indicated as a link by a different color (such as blue), underline, highlight, or by nothing at all. If you “hover” your mouse

over a hyperlink without clicking on it, it may change color or be highlighted, and your mouse pointer may change to a hand.




Hyperlinks are used to instantly take you to another web page but they also have many other uses. They can, for example, take you to a different place on the same web page, document, or spreadsheet. Or they may just open a small box or window on your screen, such as when using menus. It is up to the person who created the web page to put in any hyperlinks and to determine what happens when you click on them. Almost anything is possible.

Sometimes clicking on a hyperlink will create a new “tab” on your web browser and keep your previous web page on a previous “tab.” Each “tab” may have its own chain of web pages you have visited.

Yes, you can create your own “hyperlinks” in your documents or spreadsheets. Ask Google how to do this and watch some good videos on how to do it. It is not difficult. It is, basically, assigning a web page address to a word or photo in your document.

If a web page (or any file such as a document or spreadsheet) contains hyperlinks and you COPY it, the hyperlinks will go with it. Sometimes you may get a text box asking if you want the active hyperlinks to be there or to copy “just the text” without any links associated with them.

But most of the time we don’t care how hyperlinks work or who put them in there – we just explore all we want by just clicking on whatever strikes our fancy. Think of a hyperlink as a free ticket to someplace else! Enjoy your surfin’ safari, dude!

Nominations and Elections for 2021

- President: Dennis Smith was previously nominated and had accepted the nomination. No additional nominations were offered. Jan Bredon moved that nominations for President be closed. Jim Albright seconded the motion, and the motion passed.
- Secretary: Liz Milford was previously nominated and had accepted the nomination. No additional nominations were offered. Carol Joliat moved that nominations for Secretary be closed. Bruce Klipec seconded the motion, and the motion passed.
- Treasurer: Tim Elder was previously nominated and had accepted the nomination. No additional nominations were offered. Carol Joliat moved to close nominations for Treasurer. Bruce Klipec seconded the motion, and the motion passed.
- Three-year Director: Jan Bredon was previously nominated and had accepted the nomination. No additional nominations were offered. Carol Joliat moved that nominations for 3-year Director be closed. Bruce Klipec seconded the motion, and the motion passed.
- Director-at-Large: Jim Albright was previously nominated and had accepted the nomination. No additional nominations were offered. Carol Joliat moved that nominations for the one-year term Director-at-Large be closed. Bruce Klipec seconded the motion, and the motion passed.
- Since all positions had only one candidate, Tim Elder moved to accept the election of all candidates by acclamation, and Carol Joliat seconded the motion. The motion passed.

Program: Video: "What can I do with an old phone?" by Chris and Jim Guld, the Geeks on Tour. This is a video of their weekly class on YouTube, "What Does This

Button Do?” It is available on their website, <https://geeksontour.com/weeklyshow>. Scroll down to October 18, 2020. A summary is below:

- You can use an old phone as a document camera by putting it on a stand, face down, and using software to connect it to your computer through Wi-Fi or USB. Chris and Jim use an app called iVCam along with Wi-Fi. Remember that the rear camera is better than the front-facing selfie camera.
- You can also use an old phone as a camera on Zoom the same way with the camera in a vertical position.
- Some things you can do with an old phone: trade it in, stick it in a drawer, recycle it, sell or donate it, give it to someone else, or repurpose it.
- Be sure to use Factory Reset before reusing, recycling, or giving it away. Do not erase photos or emails; use Factory Reset instead.
- Most old phones can be used in an emergency to call 911.
- An “old phone” is a phone that has no cell service or SIM card. Most old phones have Wi-Fi but may need to be plugged in as batteries wear out.
- Some uses for “old phones” without cell service:
 - Play music downloaded through Wi-Fi.
 - Use as Kindle Book Reader, downloading books through Wi-Fi.
 - Use as a camera, flashlight, or magnifying glass.
 - Use as a remote for Chromecast on TV.
 - Let “Alfred” watch your house. The old phone is the camera in your home and your regular cell phone is the viewer. The website is Alfred.camera.
- These videos of programs are free on the geeksontour.com website. They also offer a yearly membership with perks such as descriptions of all the shows and Backstage Pass Zoom meetings after the weekly show.

Q&A:

Cherie Parker has an iPad and gets the message that it has no SIM card. Dennis said that it could have a cell connection if it had a SIM card but that it would work on Wi-Fi without one. Several members have iPads with Wi-Fi only.

Carol Joliat asked whether a SIM card can be moved to another phone. Dennis answered that the provider would probably have to do it.

Cherie asked how to use the phone to magnify. Dennis said that you can zoom in with the camera or get an app for it.

Dennis found a new computer sales and service store in Massillon near the bus station. It is Ohio TechWorks. He described a wonderful sale last Saturday and there will be another one coming up next month. Dennis got permission to drop off some club flyers there. Cherie asked what “smart TV” means. Dennis answered that a smart TV has access to streaming sites such as Hulu and Netflix built in. Adding a Firestick or similar device can make a dumb TV into a smart one.

Bruce Klipec saw a warning on the Internet that you should not run Checkdisk on an SSD drive in the latest version of Windows 10.

Adjournment: Liz Milford moved to adjourn the meeting. Jim Albright seconded the motion. The meeting was adjourned at 8:26 PM.

It is hosted by Ron Brown, who gave our club a presentation about Chromebooks a few months ago, and Hewie Poplock, another techie. The meeting starts with a chat at 11:30 AM EST; people can ask questions then or just talk about the weather or whatever. I'm usually silent. Then at noon, the meeting begins and lasts an hour. Ron Brown, Hewie Poplock, Bob Gosticha, and others give presentations about many tech topics and the meeting ends with Ray Baxter giving his music segment. This last week there were 99 or 100 people attending, which is the maximum. It was also the first week that the noon segment was shown live on YouTube.
